"Without access to education, children are more vulnerable to exploitation and recruitment by armed groups. Education is one of the most effective tools we have to break this cycle," says Geetanjali Narayan, UNICEF's representative for Haiti (Reuters, 2024).

Grassroots organizations, international NGOs, and passionate local teachers are working tirelessly to rebuild schools, train educators, and provide scholarships for vulnerable children. But these efforts require sustained funding and global support.

"Our mission is to provide free education to Haitian children who are eager to learn and gain the skills required to lead healthy, productive lives," states the organization's mission ([Lumiere D'Education](#)).
